ince starting my journey with Girl Guides Singapore (GGS) five years ago, I have been inspired by the organisation's clear sense of purpose and unwavering dedication towards empowering girls and women. 2019 was another excellent year of achievement as we focused on GGS' chosen theme of Leadership: Girls Leading Change, in line with the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts' (WAGGGS) overarching direction.

STRENGTHENING GGS' CAPABILITIES

Highlights included the GGS Carnival and Gala Dinner which raised more than \$1 million to fund GGS' plans to enable even more girls and young women to benefit from lifechanging Girl Guiding experiences and develop as leaders.

We are deeply appreciative of the generous giving by our community of Guiding supporters - in particular, Gala Dinner sponsors Mr Philip Ng, Mr Robert Ng and Mrs Dorothy Chan of Far East Organization, and key donors¹, including Hotel Properties Limited, Keppel Care Foundation, Khoo Teck Puat Foundation, Millenia Pte Ltd, nTan Corporate Advisory, Tan Chin Tuan Foundation, and Tanoto Foundation.

The successful launch of our Corporate Cookies Project to tap potential corporate sponsors also benefitted the community, as many companies chose to donate the purchased cookies to charitable causes. I would like to acknowledge GGS Vice-President for Fundraising Ms Koh Kah Sek for leading our efforts.

Operationally, GGS effectively streamlined various administrative support systems. We are excited that the new GGS online handbook platform is gaining traction with leaders and girls. We also embarked on our IT upgrading plans to advance GGS' digitalisation strategy. Our sincere thanks to Singtel for their unstinting support and donation towards our IT efforts.

During the year, the Council continued to make steady progress with key governance and strategic priorities to strengthen GGS' capabilities. On this note, we are happy to welcome new appointment holders – Mrs Koh-Teh Yi Wen, Ms Siti Nurbaya Jumain, Ms Tan Pau Cheng, Mrs Yvette Cheak, Ms Tan Ngee Tiang and Ms Candice Soh – who bring unique expertise and insights to Council. We would also like to express our thanks to Ms Kum Chew Foong, Ms Melanie Ho, Mrs Petrina Giam and Ms Charmain Loy for their contributions during their tenure.

We want to especially recognise Mrs Wah Teng Siew and Ms Goh Soon Poh, who have served the Movement for a long time. In line with the charity governance guidelines, they have completed their full 10-year term and have stepped down from Council. Your tireless support, guidance and dedication over the years is deeply appreciated.



LOOKING FORWARD

As we look ahead to 2020, many exciting plans are underway to further our Guiding mission. Amidst this unparalleled momentum are changes on the leadership front.

Come 2020, our Chief Commissioner Ms Kim Lay Eng will be stepping down as she completes her 10-year service on the Council and will continue to serve as Adviser to GGS. On behalf of GGS, our heartfelt thanks to you, Kim, for your commitment and leadership. We are pleased that Ms Gan Siow Huang who has been with GGS as the Deputy Chief and Membership Commissioner, will serve as the new Chief Commissioner, starting May 2020.

On a more personal note, I will be stepping down as President on May 2020. I have learnt so much during my tenure and am very grateful to all who have extended support and advice. I will treasure the Guiding friendships forged. It is my pleasure to introduce Dr Seetha Subbiah who will be taking over from me. She comes with a wealth of experience working in the area of psychology and mental health, serving children, youths and adults.

Chief Commissioner's Report





o19 gave us many reasons to celebrate. Against a Girl Guiding landscape that is evolving rapidly, not just in Singapore but globally, GGS made steady progress in our efforts to stay nimble and agile. Many of our most important achievements involved creating new and innovative Guiding experiences, while remaining committed to our core Guiding values.

Celebrating World Thinking Day at Our Tampines Hub was a major highlight. Our GGS Carnival successfully rallied more than 4,000 GGS members, girls and leaders from 62 schools, as well as generous sponsors and supporters, to raise a record \$288,000 to fund new programmes. This also marked the launch of our 2019 campaign to develop girl leaders, leveraging WAGGGS' new Leadership Model. This pioneering initiative, which piloted in Singapore in 2017, equipped our GGS staff and volunteer trainers with invaluable facilitation experience.

SUPPORTING HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT

To help our girls become better problem-solvers, critical thinkers, and inspirational leaders, GGS rolled out a wide range of badge and training initiatives. High-impact global badge programmes complemented GGS' core 5-point programme. They encompass relevant topics, such as cyber-bullying, body confidence, entrepreneurship, coding, and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) opportunities.

By championing meaningful girl-led local community outreach initiatives, we prepared girls and women to thrive as responsible global citizens. At the same time, we enabled more than 30 girls and 18 adult leaders to attend international Guiding events across nine different countries.

In line with our sustained commitment to support our Guiders, GGS enlisted a new format Guiders' Conference, targeted training programmes and online learning resources to help shape confident leaders and mentors. We were particularly proud that leaders embraced the challenge to develop as role models and badge programme experts in emerging areas, such as Sustainable Development Goals and STEM. Our GGS HQ senior trainer Jasmine Cheong deserves special mention for earning her accreditation as a WAGGGS' certified trainer.

During the year, we also updated the Puan Noor Aishah (PNA) Award to align with MOE's objectives for purposeful learning and streamline its administration process. Our congratulations to members who gave their best to Guiding, including 134 PNA Award, 176 Chief Commissioner's Badge Award, 90 Baden-Powell Award, 8 President's Guide Award, and 185 service award recipients!

ENERGISING THE MOVEMENT

The same focus and determination that delivered GGS' most successful fundraising year in 2019 is fuelling our longer-term plans to grow our membership in the communities. Expanding our inclusion initiatives will provide many more girls and young women access to the benefits of Guiding.

To support these ambitions, our staff, Exco and key subcommittee members invested time for teambuilding at the Strengths Transform workshop. We also completed GGS' first submission of WAGGGS' Capacity Assessment Tool to identify areas of strength and improvement.

Looking ahead, we hope more young women will step forward to energise the Movement by taking on leadership positions in GGS. To this end, we welcome Ms Chng Jia Min, Ms Dawn Lim, Ms Mary Lim, Ms Siti Farhana Maidin and Ms Nur Siti Hawa Nor Hashim to Exco. We also want to extend our thanks to outgoing commissioners Ms Jess Lay, Ms Keira Htay, Ms Ng Kim Geok and Ms Soh Cheng Peng for their dedication and service.

Finally, as I hand over as Chief Commissioner, a personal note of thanks to all whom I have had the honour of working with to further our Guiding mission. Going forward, in fulfilling GGS' mission of developing girls and women, let's continue to empower each girl to make a difference, to reach her fullest potential, and to write her own story!

s GGS President Ms Chang Hwee Nee and Chief Commissioner Ms Kim Lay Eng step down from their roles in May 2020, we take a quick look back on their journey with GGS.

As President between 2015 and 2020, Ms Chana brought out the best in GGS with her unique brand of leadership. Her approachable personality and balanced insights helped raise the bar on GGS' operational management and governance systems. She also strengthened GGS' financial position by increasing industry visibility of and support for our Guiding mission. To this end, Ms Chang was actively involved in several significant initiatives, including: GGS' special SG50 commemoration event to honour our Guiding Pioneers (2015), two fundraising Gala dinners (2016/2019), as well as various service learning and mega-scale GGS events, including our year-long GGS Centenary Celebrations (2017), Singapore's largest coastal clean-up (2018) and WTD Carnival (2019). A strong believer in building a strong supportive community, Ms Chang always found time to support Guiding events, such as recently joining our leaders and girls on the GGS Coast-to-Coast Trail Walk!

As Chief Commissioner between 2013 and 2020, Ms Kim focused on working closely with Council, Exco and staff members to transform GGS. A spirited leader, she constantly challenged

GGS leaders and staff to think creatively, beyond 'traditional' activities, to implement innovative Guiding programmes that are exciting and relevant to new generations of girls and leaders. This resulted in many key milestones, including the enrichment of our core Brownie and Guidina programmes with high-impact 21st Century skillsbuilding programmes, such as Free Being Me, She Solves badge in collaboration with BAE to promote STEM amongst girls, and Leadership Mindsets Model, which GGS piloted with WAGGGS in 2017. A strong champion for opportunities to develop girls into responsible global citizens and leaders, Ms Kim also prioritised strong connections with our industry partners, especially on issues such as sustainability and community service, and participation of GGS members at international Guiding events.

Over the years, Ms Chang and Ms Kim not only advanced GGS' mission and values, they also inspired and energised us by driving new strategic focus and support to meet the evolving needs of members and the Guiding Movement. On behalf of all of us at GGS, our heartfelt thanks to you both, Ms Chang and Ms Kim, for your commitment and contributions to GGS and your belief in empowering girls to reach their fullest potential. We wish you the very best in your future endeavours!



World Thinking Day Carnival & Road Show

019 was the landmark year for Girlguiding to develop girl leadership.

Inspired by WAGGGS' global World Thinking Day (WTD) 2019 focus on of Leadership, we envisioned the GGS Carnival and Roadshow, with its theme of Girls Leading Change.

On 23 February, more than 4,000 girl members and Guiders from 62 schools – along with GGS HQ Olave Unit, Young Adults and Trefoil Guild members – gathered at Our Tampines Hub. Together, we celebrated Guiding friendships and cultivated next-generation girl leaders through community involvement and service.

Guest-of-honour Ms Low Yen Ling, Senior Parliamentary Secretary - Ministry of Education & Ministry of Manpower and former Girl Guide, celebrated with the girls. Stories from her Guiding days highlighted the lasting impact of acquiring life skills and lifelong friendships.

LAUNCH OF NEW WAGGGS LEADERSHIP MODEL

Carnival participants learnt about WAGGGS' new Leadership Model from hands-on activities and saw Girlguiding leadership-in-action. Learning about the different types of leadership helped them to know how to put leadership into action to bring about positive change in our world.













Throughout the day, the girls practised leadership skills, demonstrated their entrepreneurial spirit, and enjoyed themselves. *The GGS Girls Got Talent* competition was a high-spirited showcase of creativity and different talents, displayed in song and dance.

WAGGGS' UNLOCK LEADERSHIP FOR CHANGE WORKSHOP

(Our Chalet, Switzerland 1 - 6 May)

Two GGS volunteers attended this unique training workshop that brought together young women from around the world to learn about WAGGGS' initiatives to address Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Together, they developed joint solutions that would make an impact in their communities.









Reflections by Ms Leong Mang Teng

As the event delegates came from across of the world, they brought very diverse perspectives about the SDGs. It was fascinating to hear about the many different ways member organisations ran each programme.

As we brainstormed to address the key issue of integrating the SDG lessons and resources into existing programmes, we finally arrived at the proposal to run capability workshops and a one-day rally event to spur the girls on to take action on selected SDGs.

Following the workshop, I shared with the 13th AP Regional Conference attendees about the WAGGGS' TheGoals.org platform and how we can become active contributors by documenting our projects and progress. Whilst most agreed that the platform is useful, they also expressed concerns about its adaptability, citing reasons such as language barrier as a potential limitation.

A visit to Our Chalet is every Girl Guide's dream. It was a humbling experience for me and I hope to return. I've made new Guiding friends from around the world and treasure the lessons learnt from each of them.

What I enjoyed most was meeting, interacting with, and learning from passionate, like-minded participants from all over the world. I was inspired by their determination to make a positive change in their communities by focusing on specific SDGs that are most relevant to their needs and challenges. A special thank you goes out to our workshop facilitators, Hannah Stanton and Jorge Sanchez, who effectively engaged us in the delivery of the workshop materials.

Even though the sudden heavy snowstorm surprised some of us, the opportunity to travel to Our Chalet for this workshop was a wonderful experience! It's true that the bonds of Girl Guiding are global – wherever we go in the world, we have sisters-in-Guiding to welcome us!

As a follow up to the workshop, we had planned for a G.I.R.L. for SDGs Rally (GIRL Rally) to take place in May 2020. However, in view of COVID-19 pandemic measures, we have postponed this to 2021. We will continue to commemorate various SDG-related events, such as International World Women's Day (8 March), Earth Hour (28 March), and Labour Day (1 May), using Just-In-Time online circulars.

This will complement virtual programmes that Girl Guides and Brownies can carry out as home-based learning.









INTERNATIONAL FIESTA (2 November)

Organised by International Committee members, International Fiesta held at GGS HQ fostered better understanding of International Guiding by enabling the girls to learn about and celebrate different cultures in the WAGGGS regions. JLS 2019 delegates delved deeply into WAGGGS' Leadership Model, which shows us how every girl can develop her potential to be a leader. GGS Senior Trainer Jasmine Cheong joined as a facilitator in United Kingdom, whilst North Division Commissioner Siti Farhana Maidin and Young Adult Putri Kartika Winata attended as participants in Sydney and Sangam.

Reflections by Ms Jasmine Cheong

JLS Facilitator Training (Kusifiri, Uganda – December 2018)
JLS Seminar (Waddow Hall, United Kingdom, 14 - 20 November)

Attending my first JLS facilitator training in Uganda, I was excited to meet young women from 16 countries. These ranged from countries with very conservative views about women's role in society and talking about gender equality is taboo, to those where gender equality is more widely accepted. I was, however, very surprised to find out that similar gender barriers can still be found in varying levels across the globe.

Livid discussions and sharing enlightened and inspired all of us to think about our role in helping girls and young women to 'Lead Out Loud'. Leading Out Loud does not refer to the volume of one's voice but rather, the volume of one's actions. The quietest girl in the world has the same capabilities to Lead Out Loud. She is no less than the loudest man in the world.

My most memorable experience was visiting a social enterprise village at Uganda, where women of all ages were taught to make reusable sanitary pads and diapers – necessities that the average



woman cannot afford. Seeing this reinforced to me how much more still needs to be done to bring about gender equality, especially in societies that still hold gender norms that limit expectations of what women can or should do. I was heartened that participants will continue to inspire and uplift one another as they work to create positive change in their communities.







Reflections by Ms Siti Farhana Maidin

(Sydney, Australia – 14 - 20 November)

Meeting and hearing so many amazing women leaders, two things stood out for me: first, their strong sense of conviction and, second, their strength in fighting to make their visions a reality for women all over the world.

Overcoming jetlag initially was a big challenge for me and fellow participants. We had to push each other to stay awake. We also had to overcome language barriers given the international mix of participants, many of whom do not use English as a first language. Being reminded to speak more slowly and use simpler words helped us to understand each other better, which made the group tasks very productive and enjoyable.

What I learnt from the seminar helped me put names to the different leadership development strategies that I have been using in my CCA meetings and activities. Having learnt and experienced the new strategies firsthand, I can now confidently communicate and utilise them to enable Brownies and Girl Guides to become more effective leaders.

Reflections by Ms Putri Kartika Winata

(Sangam, India – 14 - 20 November)

Learning about issues like gender equality through activities like the trivia quiz - made me
realise there are so many things I don't know
about and so much more that I can learn.
My understanding about Gender Equality,
Responsibility, and Creative and Critical Thinking
Mindsets grew significantly over the short few days!

For me, my most valuable takeaway from JLS was clarity and understanding about the WAGGGS Leadership Mindsets. Being able to put them into practice during the Wadi and Pune Challenges really helped me internalise the concepts. Because of that, I can now finally put names to the leadership practices I've been using.

The most challenging thing I had to do was getting into character for role-playing scenarios. Close second was climbing the three-storey high Sangam water tower - without ropes!

I was glad to meet such a diverse group of participants – the good mix of ages, personalities and experiences produced many different and fresh perspectives during our discussions. I really enjoyed the cultural diversity, especially our African friends who livened up the seminar with their impromptu dance performances!


West Division Day (9 March)

SERVICE LEARNING

Girlguiding prepares our girls for meaningful service in the community. Empathy training shares insights into the needs of the aged in society and imparts practical skills, such as making conversation. Girls gain confidence to proactively engage and interact with the elderly.

North Division marked its 10th year of service learning at the Sree Narayana Mission Home (SNM) in 2019. Guides and Brownies leaders from each school joined SNM staff in January to learn about creating enriching programmes that enliven residents' lives. One successful collaborative project led by Compassvale Secondary and Admiralty Primary featured fun activity stations, such as bowling, to engage the elderly.

Between February and
November, more than 200 East
Division Guides visited and
bonded with St John's Home
for the Elderly residents. As the
girls played card games, drew
pictures, and sang and danced
with the residents, many became
inspired to serve as volunteers to
help our aging population.



LARGE-SCALE DIVISION-WIDE ACTIVITIES

Division-wide activities are excellent platforms for girls to learn to organise large-scale activities. They develop essential life skills and values, such as leadership, teamwork, resilience, confidence and resourcefulness.

South Division Learning Day 2019 (27 July) for more than 500 Brownies, Guides and Guiders demonstrated Girlguiding's holistic learning approach. Sessions included BAE Systems "She Solves" Engineering Badge; workshops for emergency shelter and rope ladder skills, campfire programme planning, and craftwork; and, a group-based reflection session to consolidate learning.





TRAILS

The annual West Division Heritage Trail (30 March) taught 100 Brownies and Guides from 21 units about Taman Jurong's rich heritage, including its culture, architecture and natural surroundings. Supported by three Secondary 3 Guides as trail leaders and mentors, the Secondary 2 Guides stepped up as committee members to plan an engaging and meaningful day out for Guides and Brownies.



REVEL, CRAFTS & CAMPFIRES

Led "by girls for girls", **West Division Campfire** (5 April), involving 750 girls from 27 units, celebrated the Guiding spirit. From planning to light-up, participation to close, the girls forged friendships through working together and joint fun activities.

More than 300 girls joined the annual West Division Craft Workshop dry run (6 July) and actual event (13 July). Rotating round-robin through five 45-minute stations - Stitching, Friendship Band Making, Paper Craft & Shrinkable Plastic Keychain, Perler Beads with Mosaic Art, and Tote Bag Design – the girls learnt and mastered new skills from peer facilitators. They made new friends from other companies whilst earning their Craft badges.

The 12th East Division Brownie Revel (26 July) for 144 Brownies and 170 Guides focused on skill-sharing. The older Guides organised and led activities, such as fire-lighting, outdoor cooking, upcycling and craftwork, enabling Brownies to interact with and learn from them.





COOKING COMPETITION

A new initiative, **North Division's Masterchef Competition**

(5 July), showcased real-life application of Guiding skills. Girls from the 10 participating schools cooked innovative and healthy dishes from a "surprise" main ingredient. Woodlands Secondary, Anderson Secondary, Singapore Chinese Girls (Secondary) and Yishun Town Secondary topped the competition, which taught all participants about healthy eating and food presentation.

CAMP CHALLENGE & PACK HOLIDAY **CHALLENGE**

(Pulau Ubin, 16-18 March)

Pre-camp preparations for Camp Committee had been very demanding, as all camping supplies had to be ferried over to the island.

Working together, the 90 Brownies, Guides and Guiders learnt valuable life and leadership lessons. The Guides collaborated closely across three sub-camps to pitch canvas tents and led the younger Brownies.

Returning after a 10-year hiatus,

the Pack Holiday Challenge - themed "We Are Outdoor Stewards" - instilled in Brownies the Leave No Trace principles.

very three years, the WAGGGS Asia Pacific Regional (APR) Conference gathers volunteer leaders and senior staff of Member Organisations (MOs) to celebrate achievements and discuss future strategies for developing Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting in the region.

Writing Her Story: Inspiring GGS Leaders

At our annual Awards Ceremony, GGS celebrates and recognises members whose outstanding service and contributions shape the Guiding Movement and the lives of girls and women in Singapore and across Asia Pacific. In line with Annual Report 2019's theme of Leadership: Her Story, we share the stories of several award recipients whose passion and leadership inspire us to reach for greater things.

s Hasna's love for Guiding started in 1952 when she joined Brownies at Kuo Chuan Girls' School (KCGS). Her journey continued in KCGS 3rd Coy Girl Guides in 1957, where she became Company Leader in 1960.

In 1963, as trainee teacher attached to KCGS, she received her appointment as Captain— the youngest in Katong District. Her Guiding passion grew as she led the Unit and shared with the girls her adventures, experiences and skills.

Guiding shaped Ms Hasna's values and character, in particular her sense of confidence and resilience. It empowered her to take on increasing responsibilities as teacher, coach and Head of Department (PE & CCA). She learned the importance of being open to new ideas and learning new skills. In addition to being Guider of KCP 1st Coy, she dedicated time to volunteer and lead at GGS, taking on roles including HQ Instructor, Special Projects Commissioner, Division Commissioner and Camp Commissioner.

Having spent more than 50 years in Guiding, her goal today as Camp Committee advisor and Drill & Ceremony mentor: Pass on her skills to empower the next generation of young leaders.

Teach your girls to be independent women with knowledge, skills and determination to give their best, peppering their thoughts and actions with sincerity, humility, courage, empathy and curiosity."

 – Mdm Mas' Words of Encouragement to Guiders dm Mas' initial disappointment over missing joining Brownies as her family couldn't afford the uniform, turned to joy in 1967 when her mother offered to sew her Girl Guides uniform. Joining 22nd Company South, she quickly developed a love for Guiding and the outdoors through joint activities with the Sea Scouts. Her passion for Guiding and helping the needy grew with 1st Central Rangers, which led her to volunteer to run 3rd Company South Girl Guides as a trainee teacher at CHIJ St. Theresa's Convent. Every school holiday was spent bringing girls camping.

Joining the Training Team in 1983, Mdm Mas met Mrs Bebe Huang and Ms Peggy Chan amongst others, who mentored her to find her calling in Training. Organising training events, attending Asia Pacific training in New Zealand (1986), and leading the Singapore Contingent to the 1st Olave International Camp in the United Kingdom (1989) honed her skills, enabling her to earn her Trainer's Certification in 1993 and WAGGGS accreditation in 1994.

Mdm Mas has continued to serve actively in GGS over the last 40 years, taking on responsibility as Commissioner of Pasir Panjang District, Training, and South and North Divisions. Her strong desire to help others has led her to spearhead initiatives, such as North Division's Sree Narayana Mission Home service learning, GGS' Centenary Project to embroider 100 blankets for St. John's Home for the Elderly, and GGS' art fundraiser at Gala 2019. Her acts of service to GGS and the many communities across Singapore are firmly grounded on the Guide Promise of giving one's best and the Guide Law.

In July 2019, she earned well-deserved recognition as one of 10 inspirational Malays in Singapore — a national title conferred by M3, a collaboration of Muis, Mendaki and Mesra.









n March, Brigadier-General Gan Siow Huang, GGS Deputy Chief Commissioner & Membership Commissioner, was honoured as one of the inductees in Singapore's Women Hall of Fame for her achievements in her Singapore Armed Forces career and personal life.

BG Gan shared that, as a child, she had been shy and reserved. Joining Brownies and Girl Guides built her confidence and readiness to take on challenges. Today, she shares her experience to encourage girls as they venture to try new things.

Ms Goh's dedication to developing Girlguiding in the Asia Pacific Region over the last 15 years has earned her the WAGGGS Asia Pacific Region Appreciation Award.



Remembering Peggy Chan (1939 - 2019)

A true-blue Guiding Pioneer, Ms Peggy Chan joined 4th Company (Central) as a Girl Guide in the 1950s, before becoming Lieutenant and then Unit Captain. Amongst the earliest leaders to earn her Camper's license. Peggy's love for outdoor adventures was legendary. Even as a full-time career woman, she was an active Guiding volunteer and leader. She was Camp Committee Chairperson (1968-1972 & 1977-1988) as well as Newton District Commissioner (1977) and Training committee member (1978).

Her notable contributions included:

- Running the first-ever Pack Holiday in Singapore at Guide HQ (1968)
- Organising the first-ever inter-division camp competition for 100 Guides and 10 Guiders, showcasing cooking, gadget-making, tent-pitching and flag-hoisting skills (1971)
- Leading the Guide Songs recording project to commemorate GGS' Diamond Jubilee year
- Developing the Camp Christine campsite vision as Camp Committee member
