To enable girls and young women to develop their fullest potential as responsible citizens of the world

Educational Offer

Girl Guides Singapore (GGS) has been providing unparalleled opportunities for girls and women to discover and develop their strengths, their skills and their fullest potential, to become responsible citizens of the world. Since the Girl Guide Movement began in Singapore in 1917, **GGS** has been delivering on our mission of building girls of courage, confidence, and character, who make the world a better place.

We empower girls and women through safe, fun and challenging programmes, and unique experiences, adventures and activities. We offer opportunities for girls to get involved in local and international communities, equipping them to make a lasting positive impact by helping others. WAGGGS' strengths lie in innovative non-formal education programmes, leadership development, advocacy work and community action, empowering girls and young women to develop the skills and confidence they need to make positive changes in their lives, in their communities and countries.

We seek to develop the girls holistically, empowering them with the skills, values and attitudes to be

- a confident person who has a strong sense of right and wrong, is adaptable and resilient, knows herself (self-awareness), is discerning in judgment, thinks independently and critically, and communicates effectively. (Character, Communication, Creativity)
- a self-directed learner who questions, reflects, perseveres and takes responsibility for her own learning. (Commitment)
- an **active contributor** who is able to work effectively in teams, is innovative, exercises initiative, takes calculated risks and strives for excellence. (Collaboration)
- a concerned citizen, both locally and globally (Citizenship)
 - Rooted to Singapore, she has a strong sense of civic responsibility, is informed about Singapore and takes an active part in bettering the lives of others in her community.
 - Aware and connected to the external world, she is engaged to participate and improve the lives of others and the environment beyond her community.

Fundamental Principles (Guide Promise and Guide Law)

The Girl Guides' Founder, Lord Robert Baden-Powell encouraged the development of the whole person. The Fundamental Principles of Girl Guiding is outlined in the Original Promise and Law.

Original Promise:

On my honour, I promise that I will do my best: To do my duty to God and the King (Or God and my country); To help other people at all times; To obey the Guide Law

Original Law:

- A Guide's honour is to be trusted.
- A Guide is loyal.
- A Guide's duty is to be useful and to help others.
- A Guide is a friend to all and a sister to every other Guide.
- A Guide is courteous.
- A Guide is a friend to animals.
- A Guide obeys orders.
- A Guide smiles and sings under all difficulties.
- A Guide is thrifty.
- A Guide is pure in thought, in word and in deed.

In Singapore's context, the Promise and the Law have been adapted to be:

Guide Promise:

I promise to do my best To do my duty to God To serve my country and help other people and To keep the Guide Law

Guide Law:

- 1. A Guide is loyal and can be trusted.
- 2. A Guide is useful and helps others.
- 3. A Guide is polite, considerate and respects her elders.
- 4. A Guide is friendly and a sister to all Guides.
- 5. A Guide is kind to all living things.
- 6. A Guide is obedient.
- 7. A Guide has courage and is cheerful in all difficulties.
- 8. A Guide takes care of her own possessions and those of other people.
- 9. A Guide is thrifty and diligent.
- 10. A Guide is self-disciplined in what she thinks, says and does.

Values and Method

As a member of WAGGGS, GGS will adopt the WAGGGS definition of non-formal education which is a planned programme of personal and social education designed to improve a range of competencies, outside formal educational structures. The Girl Guide non-formal educational programmes should:

- 1. Have identified learning objectives
- 2. Engage the learner through a varied range of activities
- 3. Be accessible and inclusive
- 4. Promote voluntary, learner centred, participation
- 5. Support each individual's learning pathway and learning styles
- 6. Be implemented by trained leaders
- 7. Have a process for monitoring and evaluation

WAGGGS uses a unique model of non-formal education to support the development of girls and young women, called the Girl Guide and Girl Scout educational method. This method has five elements:

1. Learning in small groups. By working positively with one another in small groups, the girls learn to support each other and to make democratic decisions. The small groups create a safe environment for the girls to develop their leadership skills, assert their needs and to take ownership in their planning.

Guides: Patrol System

To train the girls in self-government and leadership for the purpose of providing the girls with the opportunity for self-training in the development of her character, to develop bonding and encourages teamwork.

- 2. My path, my pace. We recognize that every girl is uniquely different with different talents and abilities. Each girl is given the space to choose her learning targets to fit her interests and abilities. She is not pressured to reach a set standard, leaving her free to take risks, make mistakes and to learn from her mistakes.
- 3. Learning by doing. Girls learn through real experiences. By engaging the girls through hands-on activities, experiments, projects, games and outdoor activities, learning is made more fun and relevant.
- 4. Connecting with others. Girls are given the opportunities to connect with other girls of various ages regardless of race, cultural, religious and social backgrounds. They learn to value others, appreciate diversity and are encouraged to develop positive relationships with one another, to cast aside prejudices and to trust and respect their leaders.
- 5. Connecting with my world. Girls learn to be active citizens. They care for the environment and their community. They are global citizens showing interest in global issues. They dare to speak out on social injustice and are advocates of issues they care about.

GGS adopts the WAGGGS Leadership Mindsets as the model of leadership practice. The WAGGGS leadership model uses a system of six mindsets as the main tool to make leadership practice conscious. These mindsets include:

- Leading Yourself Reflective mindset
- Leading Relationships Collaborative mindset
- Leading for Innovation Creative and Critical thinking mindset
- Leading for Impact Responsible action mindset
- Leading for Girls' Empowerment Gender equality mindset
- Leading in Context Worldly mindset

In the Singapore context, at the end of the Secondary education, the Girl Guides are developed in:

- 1. RESILIENCE. She is able to handle challenges confidently and cheerfully.
- 2. INTEGRITY. She demonstrates a high level of integrity, upholding the Guide Law and Promise in all that she does
- 3. COMPASSION. She has a heart of compassion for the less fortunate, is able to empathize with them and is willing to lend a helping hand when called upon.
- 4. EMPOWERMENT. She is a leader and seeks to make a positive influence in the community that she is in.

The following are the skills identified by WAGGGS to enable young people to thrive in a rapidly changing world and empower them to live the life they want to lead.

- Character: Self-aware and confident, we take initiative to set and achieve goals, both individually and by leading others.
- Creativity: We are creative thinkers and resilient problem solvers. We self-direct our learning to access, evaluate and apply information, and develop innovative solutions.
- Citizenship: We are active in our local communities and connect to the wider world. We would want to take action to make the world a better place.
- Communication: We express our ideas confidently to different audiences, are good listeners and respond empathetically to others.

- Collaboration: We are true team players, who understand how to work positively with people and care about diversity.
- Commitment: We are committed to our own learning and development and invest in it throughout our lives.
